#### PREFACE

Education leads an individual from darkness of ignorance to the light of knowledge and helps in the all round development of a person. It facilitates the growth of a nation and overall development of the society.

Inherently each one of us has the substance within, to achieve our goals and dreams. What is missing is the training, the guidance and the insight to use what we already have. It is now widely recognized that the continuing lack of women education and empowerment has had a delirious impact in several areas but is also acknowledged that an acceleration in programmes for women education can lead rapidly into their empowerment with all the resultant advantages to our society.

In the context of the steel city of Bhilai, which had all the basic amenities and facilities for its residents, till late1970s, the lack of an educational institution for women used to compel many parents to send their daughters to other cities for higher education. The educationists, intellectuals and industrialists of the steel city got together and formed Bhilai Education Trust to sow the tiny seed of this prime institution namely the Bhilai Mahila Mahavidyalya, Bhilai Nagar three decades ago.

The College had a humble start in 1979, with just two faculties of Science and Home Science run in the two rooms of a local girls school run by Bhilai Steel Plant, with a handful of students, four teachers and a Principal. The foundation of college building was laid by the Honourable Chief Minister of Madhya Pradesh Shri Virendra Kumar Sakhlecha on 3<sup>rd</sup> Nov, 1978. The college shifted to its present independent, self contained building constructed on an area of 14 acres of land given by Bhilai Steel Plant situated on the main route between the township of Bhilai and Durg, which is easily accessible even to the students commuting by the public transport. Monitored and guided by the Bhilai Education Trust, Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur and Department of Higher Education, Govt. of Chhattisgarh, Raipur and supported by the tireless efforts and efficiency of the dedicated staff and talented students, the institution has grown from a tiny sapling to a mighty tree, with its deep roots and branches spread over diversified fields of activities. In the span of these three decades and more, the strength of students has gone up to almost 1700 and that of the staff to almost 100. The college is recognized under Section2 (f) and 12(B) of the UGC Act, 1956.

Bhilai Mahila Mahavidyalya is an ambitious, innovative and progressive institution which is developing physical character, reflecting genuine quality of educational services, energetic and stimulating environment for girl students to achieve their goals within a short time. The college has earned a prestigious name in academic field and grown both qualitatively and quantitatively as reflected, year after year, in the merit list of Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur along with the laurels brought by its students in the field of sports, extra-curricular and co- curricular activities. The college can boast of producing a distinguished alumni, thus playing a vital role in registering continuous success and strengthening its contribution to women education.

#### **CRITERION I: CURRICULAR ASPECTS**

The College has throughout been the most sought after institution of the town and the nearby areas affiliated to Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University Raipur. The College follows the syllabus prescribed by the affiliated university.

The university from time to time keeps changing and framing the syllabus so that the students are prepared accordingly to meet the challenges of the times.

The college aims to uplift even those students coming from the nearby rural and under privileged areas by providing holistic and need based education to these women folk.

It strives to attain excellence in all fields and spheres and makes efforts to convert its mission and goals through various means and modes like the college prospectus, meetings, interviews, teachers, classes and various curricular and co-curricular activities. A highly qualified teaching staff is actively involved in ensuring quality education.

The College offers undergraduate courses in three faculties Science, Home Science and Commerce and Postgraduate courses in **11** subjects namely BioTechnology, Botany, Chemistry, Commerce, Computer Science, Human Development, Maths, Microbiology Physics, Textile and Clothing, Zoology and Vocational courses in PGDCA and Bachelor of Education. All PG courses excepting Human Development are Self Financing in nature.

Many of the staff members of the institutions are Members of Board of Studies who are actively involved in the curriculum designing of Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University Raipur, which is periodically reviewed and revised.

Seminars, Workshops and talks by eminent speakers are organized from time to time to enlighten and acquaint the staff and students about the advancement in various areas to cope with the challenges of the world outside and the job market.

The college extends additional coaching to the students who are academically weak in the form of Remedial Classes, sponsored by UGC. The teachers also take extra classes as and when required and provide counseling and mentoring to the students.

Curricular and extracurricular enrichment is facilitated through the formation of various societies and associations so that the students can discover and hone their abilities and talents.

The societies not only inculcate a sense of responsibility but also train the students to respect the feelings and emotions of others.

Sports and games find a very important place in the institution inculcating in the student a healthy team spirit and the importance of fair play, discipline and endurance. The IQAC cell, the staff council and departmental meetings appraise the performance and feedback of the students and make suggestions for all round improvement thus making the institution a premier centre of higher education for women. The goals and objectives are enforced into the academic curriculum to the maximum possible to ensure that the expected outcomes are achieved to their utmost.

#### **CRITERION II: TEACHING, LEARNING AND EVALUATION**

The College aims to impart all round development that focuses on social, emotional, spiritual and aesthetic development of every student so that they emerge into the world as women of substance.

Admission is given to the students on the basis of the marks obtained in their qualifying exams and separate merit list is prepared for SC/ST/OBC/General students. The students are counseled by the senior faculty regarding their choice of subjects and finally admitted in the respective faculty after a one to one interaction with the Principal.

• The college follows the reservation policy in accordance with the rules of the State Government and Pandit Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur. There is a provision for reservation as per Government rules for SC- 12%, ST- 32%, OBC- 14% and Physically challenged students – 3%.

A greater demand for Commerce and Science subjects has always been observed. The college believes in giving equal opportunities to all students and also organizes orientation courses for facing competitive exams.

The needs of advanced learners are encouraged through multiple options of assessment and evaluation. Special attention is given to students with special needs along with economically and socially weaker students.

The conventional lecture method is normally adapted for teaching but supplemented through participation of students in group discussions, question hour sessions and seminars presentations. Field trips, workshops, educational tours, practical assignments, group discussions and extensive use of ICT enrich the learning experience of the students. Add on courses are also offered to upgrade the knowledge and skill of the students. Workshops, Seminars, Surveys, dissertation are an integral part of the academic activities. The college has set up a Smart classroom with all necessary facilities.

Students' performance is regularly assessed and evaluated through tutorials test, assignments, projects and practicals. Students are counseled and mentored under tutor ward system and the IQAC ensures quality enhancement.

Highly qualified and competent teaching faculty is recruited to ensure high quality education. The selection of Permanent Staff has been done by the selection committee constituting of a member from the University, State Government and College Management through interview and the selection of the adhoc staff is done by the Management as per UGC guidelines. Presently the college has **17** permanent teachers, a sports officer and a librarian appointed by UGC along with **17** teachers appointed under Statute 28 and 10 teachers appointed by the Management. The Management appoints and substitutes staff as and when need arises and additional faculty is appointed to teach the new programs. Presently it has **32** such teachers on roll and **32** employees working as non teaching staff. The college has **14** teachers with M.Phil and **20** with Ph.D. Our teachers have also received awards and recognitions in the academic and other fields. Several of the teachers have had their papers published in their respective subjects along with their participation in National and International Seminars and Conferences where they have presented papers on varied subjects.

The College arranges On Job training programs for students in Microbiology, Biotechnology, and Computer Science alongwith placement opportunities in IT and concerned companies.

#### **CRITERION III: RESEARCH AND CONSULTANCY**

The development of any institution is not possible without the contribution of its faculty and students to research activities.

The promotion of research culture in our institution is activated through availability of free access to internet, library facility, subscription to journals and e-journals through **N-LIST.** Dissertations, Industrial Trainings, Summer Trainings and Project Work which are important parts of the PG curriculum help the students to inculcate the Research Culture.

The Faculty Development Programmes and workshops for faculty help them in their research pursuits. Conferences and Seminars are organized annually in various subjects. The college has already conducted **7** Conferences and **8** Workshops in different subjects.

The faculty is encouraged to pursue higher studies/research work. Currently 20 of our teachers have completed their Ph.D. and 5 are enrolled for it.

The field trips and extension activities make the students aware of the Institutional Social Responsibility and Commitment and several extension activities conducted have initiated the students to serve the society and promote social consciousness. The N.S.S. units have helped the surrounding villagers by spreading awareness regarding Literacy, Health, Hygiene and Environmental Pollution, Human rights etc. Blood donation camps and awareness camps regarding causes and prevention of AIDS have also been organized. The College collaborates with a number of clubs and associations at different levels in attaining common objectives of educational and social services.

The Placement cell collaborates with numerous renowned companies who visit and interview the students in and out of the campus periodically and a large number of students find placement with them.

#### **CRITERION IV: INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES**

The better the physical infrastructure and surroundings the more congenial it is to impart quality education to the students and give them a homely atmosphere. This also helps the Institution to maintain its standards and provide sufficient opportunities to cater to the innumerable needs of its students.

Spread over a sprawling campus of 14 acres the college can boast of possessing a double storeyed building since 1982 with a number of Class rooms, Laboratories, Library and Computer Department. The College also has a Botanical garden where specific plants required by the Botany department for their practicals are grown. It also has a lush green lawn inside the campus with a beautiful nursery with seasonal plants and flowers to add to its beauty. Making the surroundings eco-friendly tall shady trees surround the boundary wall of the campus. The College is in proud possession of an auditorium cum gymnasium. It is so designed that it can be used not only for indoor games but has a seating capacity of around 800 persons where cultural activities can also be organized.

The air conditioned Computer lab has about 50 computers with all the necessary software support and connected through LAN and Internet. Other than B.Sc. in Computers, BCA and PGDCA, the computer department imparts special computer training to the B.Sc. (Home Science) and B.Com. students as an additional subject.

ICT facilities are available to all teachers. Quite a many Labs have their own OHP/LCD, Laptops, Desktop computers, white boards and other required apparatus. All the labs have their Lab attendants other than the subject teachers who see to it that the labs are sufficiently equipped and maintained.

The well arranged air conditioned, and partially computerized library has around 28,600 books and 32 Journals with a seating capacity of 80 students. The library also has 1 multiseat system of 10 computers and 2 desktops. The library ensures the acquisition of latest edition of books and publications by accessing various websites, catalogues and book reviews etc. as per the recommendations of the library advisory committee.

The College has subscribed to National Library and Information Services Infrastructure of Scholarly content (N-LIST) programme of the **INFLIBNET** Ahemdabad. The Librarian and Library staff are well trained and readily provide help and information to the users.

The College ensures regular maintenance and upkeep of all infrastructural facilities. The maintenance work is carried out by trained in house experts and also outsourced to other appropriate agencies. Furniture and equipments are regularly purchased to keep the infrastructure upgraded.

The College also has quite a few support services in the campus. The hostel houses more than 100 girls every year and has a dining hall, a kitchen and a common room. Important festivals and various occasions are celebrated by the hostellers with full fervor and enthusiasm. The college students and hostellers when need arises are taken to the adjacent JLN Hospital run by Bhilai Steel Plant if the situation gets beyond utilizing the First aid facility available in the institution.

The College has earned a name for itself in the arena Sports and Games as well. It has facilities to organize Basketball, Throwball, Kho-kho, Kabaddi, Hockey and Volleyball tournaments in its campus on the sprawling grounds.

Though the college has only one Sports officer she is helped by the other staff when need arises. Special coaches are invited to coach the students before they participate in the Inter University or Inter State tournaments.

The college has taken up significant expansion work by building additional class rooms, toilets for staff and students, various blocks, as well as expansion of library.

#### **CRITERION V: STUDENT SUPPORT AND PROGRESSION**

Students being the primary Stakeholders, the College ensures their all round development so that they can contribute to the National development in return.

The college admits students from all social milieus and tries to empower them through regular mentoring and counseling to face the challenges of life and become responsible citizens of the country.

The strength of the college has varied from 1300-1700 in the last few years being 1659 this year which includes both UG and PG students. Students coming from other states also seek admission in addition to the local and other students coming from near by areas having cleared their XII class exam through either C.G. or Central Board.

The students are given the College Brochure at the time of admission comprising of all details about the Institution, admission procedure, rules, fee structure and achievements of the students in various areas.

The senior students of the various faculties organize Welcome functions for the Freshers where they are oriented by the Principal and their respective Heads of Department.

The Principal, the Professor Incharge of Students Union and Heads of Departments are always ready to listen to the personal, career and academic related problems of the students and try to help them. The College provides financial support to the students belonging to SC/ST/OBC sections in the form of scholarships of State Government and other agencies.

Many of our students are also availing the advantages of Merit scholarship sponsored by various agencies. Fee concession and Book bank facilities are given to financially weak students.

The anti ragging committee ensures a conducive and secure environment for the freshers.

Prizes on the Annual day function are given to meritorious students and those excelling in the field of sports, co-curricular and extra curricular activities. Special support is also imparted to slow learners and those who need additional help, through a variety of sources such as remedial and extra classes.

The overall pass percentage of the students has been 70% in UG and 90% in PG level. Many of our students are placed in the merit list of the Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University Raipur every year with quite a many adorning the first position. Majority of students get first division with distinction. About 90% of students progress from UG to PG, 9 % from PG to Research and 35 % from PG to employment. The drop out rate has been only 10%. During the last five year three of our teachers and two of our students have cleared NET and SLET exams.

The College has an IQAC cell to promote and control quality initiatives. Recreational, Cultural and Sports facilities are extended to the students in which the students participate actively in various competitions and programmes are conducted to bring out the hidden talents of the students. Our college students have brought laurels in various Intercollegiate, State and National level competitions in sports, co-curricular and extra-curricular activities.

## CRITERION VI: ORGANIZATION AND MANAGEMENT/GOVERNANCE AND LEADERSHIP

Following the mission of the institution, the Management, Principal Teaching and Non-Teaching Staff are well aware of their responsibilities and duties and carry them out sincerely. Their concern and commitment to the goals of higher education are evident through their efforts of utilizing the resources and introducing Vocational and Job oriented courses.

The Governing Body consists of Managing Trustee- Bhilai Education Trust (Chairman, Bhilai Mahila Mahavidyalaya) who is nominated by Bhilai Steel Plant, two nominees of Foundation Society, two Trustee members, Secretary- Bhilai Education Trust, Principal-Member Secretary, one Representative of Higher Education Department, Government of Chhattisgarh, Raipur, two University Representatives and two Teacher Representatives. Various committees are constituted by the Principal that carry out various activities and duties deputed to them. The Teaching and Non Teaching staff is appointed as per UGC rules and Management criteria. As for the financial resources the College gets Grants in aid from the State Government, collects fees from the students and generates resources from Self Financing courses. During 2013-14 the college received an amount of Rupees **1**, **82,88,570/-** as Grant in aid and Rupees **5,96,73,219/-** from Government of Chhattisgarh towards salary and arrears .

The College was sanctioned Development Assistance of -(1) Rs. 4.25 Lac in 2012 - 2013, (2) 12.95 Lac in 2013 - 2014 by UGC for XII Plan. The Annual budget is prepared which is approved by the Management and the accounts audited annually by Charted Accountants appointed by the Management .The accounts of UGC grants are also audited and the utilization certificate issued by the Charted Accountants are sent to the CRO, UGC Bhopal. The governance of the college is based on the principles of transparency, flexibility and innovation. The HODs and IQAC monitor the quality of annual teaching learning process while the Management supervises the overall administration.

The Principal interacts with the Teachers, Parents and Students and seeks formal feedback on various aspects including teaching-learning evaluation and extending facilities and other provisions.

The HODs of various departments provide detailed information regarding the functioning of their respective departments.

The College Staff plays an important role in ensuring quality functioning of academic and administrative units of the college for which it has proposed a number of best practices in various fields of institutional functioning. Committees have been setup to take care regarding the improvement in many areas. It analyses the feedback and recommends suitable measures for positive results.

The Principal and HODs give suggestions and guidance for the betterment of the departments and also encourage them for growth and improvement.

#### **CRITERION VII: INNOVATIONS AND BEST PRACTICES**

The Teaching staff always makes efforts to set the right precedent for the students in terms of hard work, conduct and punctuality. The teaching and non teaching staff consistently assures that the administrative functions of the college are also discharged with full dedication. The institution lays stress not only on academic achievements but also on personality development and general conduct of the students through sports, extra-curricular, cocurricular and social activities.

The NSS units have been working over the years with a sense of social service and serving and guiding the villagers in varied ways. The Placement cell of the institution has been apprising the students about the job opportunities in the different arenas and also training the students to face interviews against campus selection. A few of our students have also been picked up for Placement by different IT firms and sent for pursuing M.S. Degree from BITS, Pilani. Various National and religious festivals are observed and celebrated both by the college students and hostellers for better communal harmony and to understand the significance of the occasions. In its quest for excellence the college has contributed in all fields over the years and made up a name for itself.

#### **1.1 Curriculum Planning and Implementation**

## **1.1.1** State the vision, mission and objectives of the institution, and describe how these are communicated to the students, teachers, staff and other stakeholders.

**Vision :** To be acknowledged as a pro-active institution which strives hard to fulfil the aspirations of students, help them in developing sound knowledge base, correct skills, attitudes and understanding to enable them to sail confidently through complexities and challenges of life.

**Mission** : To respect and honour humanity at large and serve the society for the betterment of mankind, we endeavour -

- To impart education to students belonging to different strata of society irrespective of caste, creed or colour.
- To uplift the deprived and academically weak students by empowering them with latest knowledge.
- To equip the students with essential skills to sail confidently through life's complexities and challenges.
- To cultivate the qualities of perseverance, dedication and excellence in the students.
- To prepare competent citizens with strong and unflinching character.

#### **Objectives :**

- To enable our students to develop their full intellectual potential through a focused academic experience that is simultaneously rich, extensive and collaborative.
- To offer the students scope for critical thinking and discernment, leading to the development of value based convictions.

- To generate among students an awareness of women issues, human rights and environmental issues, so that they can understand and respond constructively to these.

## **1.1.2** How does the institution develop and deploy action plans for effective implementation of the curriculum? Give details of the process and substantiate through specific example(s).

Action Plan for Effective Implementation of the Curriculum:

- The College is affiliated to Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur (C.G.). The curriculum is designed by the affiliating University and is made available to the College for implementation. Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur (C.G.) updates the curriculum keeping in view the changing educational requirments.
- 2. The College calendar which is updated in accordance with the calendar of the affiliating University, Raipur (C.G.) comprises of the various co-curricular and extra curricular activities. The implementation of the academic calendar is monitored systematically by the Principal and respective Heads of the Department.
- 3 At the beginning of each academic session, a general staff meeting is convened to formulate action plan which would help to give students opportunities to achieve the objectives of the various scheduled programmes.
- 4. The Teaching Staff are allotted their duties and responsibilities for the academic year.

- 5. The Faculty members systematically communicate the entire curriculum to the students at the beginning of the academic session.
- 6. The teaching staff prepare their teaching plans according to the prescribed teaching units and teaching hours as prescribed by the University.
- 7. The Principal and respective HODs monitor the progress of T/L activity through periodic review of academic diaries. The diaries filled daily by teachers also record the co-curricular and extra-curricular activities in addition to their daily teaching assignments. The diary system ensures the timely completion of all syllabi and the smooth functioning during the session. It also helps the authorities in teacher assessment. The college practices both conventional and innovative teaching methodologies for effective learning. Besides the traditional lecture method and the blackboard method the Teaching Staff makes regular use of ICT- enabled teaching methods like power point presentations.
- The T/L activity is further augmented by organizing classroom seminars, student workshops, group discussions, home assignments and mini research projects, for curricular and co- curricular activities which offer students optimum learning experiences.
- 9. Revision and remedial classes are also held.
- 10. The college practices a sound assessment and evaluation mechanism. Internal assessment of the students is done through unit tests, sessional examinations, and viva-voce. The internal assessment also covers the students' attendance and conduct besides their curricular and extra-curricular performances. The external evaluation is done by the university through the external examiners appointed by the University for the Annual / Semester Examinations.
- 11. The College pursues the academic activity as per the prescribed norms and instructions laid by the parent university being an affiliated college; we devise our own systems to supplement the University programmes for the maximum T/L output for the achievement of goals and objectives of the college.

**1.1.3** What type of support (procedural and practical) do the teachers receive (from the University and/or institution) for effectively translating the curriculum and improving teaching practices?

#### Support from the Institution to the Teachers:

- It is mandatory to follow the Syllabus and Curriculum prescribed by the parent affiliating University- Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur. The University also issues an academic calender on the basis of which the College plans and prepares its own academic calendar. The calendar mentions the dates of admission to various courses offered, occasions and holidays, internal exams, educational tours, annual function, final exams and other events.
- Curricular activities include the theory lectures, laboratory work, project work, seminars, exhibitions.
- Co-curricular activities include field visit, educational training programmes, excursions, skill development, programmes, personality development programme, awareness programme and competitions.
- Extracurricular Programmes include Sports and Games, Cultural NSS, AIDS Awareness Activities, Youth Festivals.

#### **Procedural Support:**

- Staff meetings are held to discuss and plan academic and other related programmes to be organized during the academic year.
- Annual, Semester-wise plans are prepared to facilitate the smooth implementation of the curriculum.

#### **Practical Support**:

- The College allocates funds for the purchase of books, materials, equipments and apparatus.
- e-learning through ICT is made available in the library.
- Experts in different fields are invited to speak on latest trends in their areas of specialization and work-experience.
- The college management sponsors Guest Lectures and talks by eminent scholars for the benefit of the teaching and learning community.

- The College management motivates the faculty members to attend seminars, orientation and refresher courses, workshops, faculty development programmes. The teachers are given Duty Leave for attending these programmes.
- Our management offers financial and logistic support for the conduct of educational tours, field and industry visits, and other excursions.
- **1.1.4** Specify the initiatives taken up or contribution made by the institution for effective curriculum delivery and transaction on the Curriculum provided by the affiliating University or other Statutory agency.

#### **Contribution of the Institution for Effective Curriculum Transaction:**

The institution has developed the following systems for the effective curriculum delivery and transaction:

- **1. Academic Calendar**: The College prepares its own academic calendar in accordance with the University's and publishes it in the college prospectus. It details the implementation of the complete educational programme for the entire session including the schedules for internal assessment/examinations for all courses conducted in the college.
- 2. Time-Table: The time table for each course is prepared at the beginning of the session. as per the University, State Government, and the UGC guidelines, The time-table takes into account the prescribed number of teaching hours for theory, practical and tutorial subjects, duration of periods, teacher work-load, shift timing etc. The teaching programme has to meet the requirement of minimum 180 teaching days as per the UGC guidelines. The time-table also takes into account the condition of teachers' minimum 40 hours per week stay in the campus.
- **3. Teaching Plans and Academic Diaries**: The teachers are required to prepare their unit-wise/lesson-wise teaching plans for the session after the teachers are allocated their subjects and submit the same to Principal who monitors the execution and progress of the syllabi on a monthly basis.
- **4.** T/L Activity: The teaching-learning activity is conducted as per the pre-announced schedules and all inputs for theory and practical subjects are given to students as prescribed by the University.

- **5.** Co-Curricular Activity: In addition to the regular classroom teaching-learning activity, the institute conducts bridge and remedial courses to maximize T/L output. The session is also interspersed with the organization of student seminars and workshops, guest lectures, field visits and industrial tours.
- 6. Extra-curricular Activity: The college also conducts on a regular basis variety of extra-curricular activities like Debate, elocution, essay writing etc.for the all-round development of students, We also have a very active Sports Department and the two NSS units. We also conduct a number of extension activities in the college.
- 7. Learning Resources: The college takes utmost care in providing as many learning resources as possible to its student in order to ensure the maximum curriculum delivery. A partially computerized library with a rich collection of over 28,600 books and inflibnet/e-journal facilities is capable of catering to the needs of over 1650 students of various courses. We also have well-equipped computer labs with internet facility and educational software.
- 8. Internal/External Assessment: The college has set up an elaborate Internal Assessment mechanism consisting of unit tests, sessionals, home assignments and viva voce in order to check the implementation of curriculum, The external assessment is carried out by the university.

## 1.1.5 How does the institution network and interact with beneficiaries such as industry, research bodies and the university in effective operationalisation of the curriculum?

The institution constantly seeks feedback from industry and research bodies and incorporates as per the requirements of the curriculum the same in its teaching activity in the form of skill development programmes.

- We also offer coaching for Bank Recruitment and other competitive examinations.
- Surveys are conducted by the UG students
- Research is pursued by teachers who are working on the UGC sponsored Minor and Major Research Projects.

The College has a well established placement cell and Career Counseling Cell. The students of final year of all disciplines and PG students register themselves in the placement cell. The placement cell organizes various programmes to prepare the

students as per the requirement of government sector, private sector, corporate sector such as:

- Entrepreneur development programme.
- Personality development programme.
- Skill development programme.
- Vocational Training Programme.

The placement cell also provides information regarding various jobs and vacancies and also trains the students to fill online application forms. Other than this, the College also organizes industrial visits and excursions for expanding the knowledge of the students.

#### **Research Bodies:**

The faculty members submit their proposals to various funding agencies such as CGCOST, UGC and DBT etc. for funding. The students are sent to various laboratories for industrial training programmes so that they are motivated towards research and investigation and also take part in various National and International Seminars, Conferences and Workshops to update their knowledge for quality enhancement.

We also invite some eminent academicians and scholars for delivering guest lectures to encourage the students. Our College faculties are also invited by various other institutions for extension lectures, Guest lectures and keynote lectures for effective operationalization and translation of the curriculum.

# 1.1.6 What are the contributions of the institution and/or its staff members to the development of the curriculum by the University? We are affiliated to the Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur C.G. All our curricula are essentially framed by the University. The syllabi of various courses running in our college are designed by the University through an elaborate mechanism which comprises the Boards of Studies and the Academic Council. Our college faculty members are members of the Board of Studies (BOS) of the different subjects.

The curricula / syllabi are designed on the basis of the feedback of teachers and other stakeholders. The university programmes/courses and the syllabi are implemented by

affiliated colleges through annual or semester patterns with prescribed academic calendar. The assessment and evaluation mechanism too is prescribed by the parent University, and being an affiliated college we implement the same.

- College is always aware of the renovations needed in the basic facilities from time to time.
- Separate book bank facility is available in the library by which SC/ST/OBC and the economically poor students can issue the books for the whole year.

Our faculty recommends latest books and references to students. Number of journals and books are regularly purchased by the college library. The fulfillment of curriculum objectives is checked through the periodic unit tests and other evaluatory methods, and corrective/remedial measures are taken in case of any deficiency in either the approach or the output

The college is well known for its distinguished faculty members, a well equipped Library, Laboratories, Sports facilities and the students.
- The institution gives wide publicity through Newspapers, Visual media and Institutional website (www.bmmbhilai.com).
- The institution strictly follows the guidelines for admission to various courses given by Department of Higher Education,(C.G.) and Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur (C.G.) and these are published in the College Prospectus.
- Counselling to students is provided by members of Admission Committee.
- The faculty members play active role in transmitting the information regarding achievements, infrastructure and courses available in the institution.

**Publicity:** At the beginning of every session the college displays the Admission notice on the College Notice Board and website of the College for all courses. We also publish our Admission Brochure well in advance. Similarly, even during vacation and ahead of the declaration of results, the college opens counseling centres for the enquiring students and parents to guide them on course selection, optional subjects and other issues.

- The college also makes use of electronic media by advertising the admission notice in newspaper, local T.V. channels and cable network.
- Our own students are sufficiently informed of all the subjects and courses offered here and people get information through them.
- Our alumni have also been the front line medium of publicity.
- The necessary information regarding admission is also put in the college website.
- The College Admission Brochure contains the detailed information regarding the criteria of admission, availability of seats, fee structure, rules and regulations to be followed by students.

- Majority of all the parents prefer to admit their wards to this college because of its reputation built up in last 35 years.
- Transparency in admission is maintained.
- The duly filled admission forms are submitted to the college office within the due dates for registration of the students for admission process.
- Merit list is prepared by the admission committee of the respective streams consisting of senior faculty members as per the University Guidelines on the basis of marks obtained in 10+2 level.
- A separate merit list is prepared for General, OBC, SC and ST students.
- There is a provision for reservation as per Government directives which is for ST-32%, SC- 12%, OBC- 14% and Physically challenged students – 3%.

#### 2.1.2. Explain in detail the criteria adopted and process of admission.

(i) Merit: Students are admitted in the order of merit as per guidelines given by Department of Higher Education, Raipur (C.G.) and Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur (C.G.) The admission committees of various faculties strictly follow these guidelines. Students are admitted in the order of merit. The selection lists of candidates are duly displayed on the Notice Board and even communicated to students telephonically and due weightage in admission is given to SC/ST/OBC and others as per State Govt. guidelines.

The reservation policy is followed strictly as per the government rules.

#### Step wise process of admission:

- Information regarding the date of admission and eligibility for admission is displayed on the Notice Board of the college.
- Prospectus and admission forms are issued within the schedule fixed by the College.
- Duly filled admission forms along with the required certificates and documents are verified by a team of faculty members and the College office.
- Admission lists and waiting lists are put up on the Notice Board mentioning the date of payment of fees for admission and the cut-off percentage set for admission into different faculties.
- The forms are re-checked by the concerned admission committee comprising of senior faculty members and endorsed finally by the Principal.

- If need arises a second merit list is prepared and same is displayed on the Notice Board.
- Reservation policy is precisely and exactly followed as per the Government rules.
- Display of the first and the subsequent merit list is done on the college Notice Board.
- The admission process is fully transparent. If any complaint arises regarding the admission, the concerned authority attends to it immediately.

The students prefer to join the vocational and job oriented courses. The admission of the last two sessions indicates the interest of the students in the main stream courses.

#### 2.2 Catering to Diverse Needs of the Students

2.2.1 How does the institution cater to the needs of differently abled students and ensure adherence to government policies in this regards.

The College is committed to offer special assistance to differently abled students for their unobstructed growth at every level, in the College.

- While planning the seating arrangement special attention is given that classes of such students are on the ground floor.
- Physically challenged students are provided with a writer in the exam, and extra time as per the university guidelines.
- Every faculty member has special responsibility towards such students in terms of boosting their self esteem and confidence to encourage them.
- Washrooms are built up in Indian style as well as western style for their convenience.
- 2.2.2. Does the institution assess the students' needs in terms of knowledge and skills before the Commencement of the programme? If 'Yes' give details on the process.

Yes, the institution assesses the needs of students at the beginning of each session and throughout the period of the course.

- At the time of the admission, the admission committee of the College conducts a brief counselling of students and their parents to evaluate what the students expect from the College and the ways the College could help them achieve their goals.
- The admission committee tries to counsel and help the students in choosing the right stream in accordance with their interests and capability.
- In the first few classes during each introductory session, group discussions are conducted to make them feel at home.
- Class tests, seminars, quiz etc. are conducted throughout the year to evaluate whether the teachers' efforts are producing good results.
- Remedial coaching is provided.
- Personality development lectures are organized from time to time to enhance the competence and confidence of the students.
- The placement cell arranges to train the students to face competitive and entrance test and also invites agencies and firms to conduct placement interviews and sessions.
- Freshers day organized by different faculties provides a platform to the students to display their talents and skills.

- 2.2.3. What are the strategies drawn and deployed by the institution to bridge the knowledge gap of the enrolled students to enable them to cope with the programme of their choice? (Bridge /Remedial/Add on/ Enrichment Courses etc.) The College tries to bridge the knowledge gap between the enrolled students as they come from different schools and different media of instruction.
  - Academically weaker students are identified by their performance in the class tests being held regularly.
  - Remedial Classes in different subjects are organized.
  - Enrichment programmes such as Personality Development, Spoken English Communication Skill Development are organized for students so as to enhance their personality.

Our college is a totally womens institution hence there is no gender discrimination. Equal opportunity is given to all the students while organizing different curricular and extra curricular activities conducted by various cells.

- There is a girls hostel providing accommodation to around 100 students.
- Various competitions are conducted to enhance the creative skills of the girls and create a healthy competitive spirit.

- Guest lectures on health, hygiene, morals and ethics and safety drives along with other relevant issues are frequently conducted.
- Yoga classes in two different sessions has been organised for the students.
- Different functions and festivals are also observed.

#### 4. Environment

- The University has introduced a compulsory paper on environmental studies.Each student has to appear and clear this paper for getting the U.G degree.
- Students submit charts and projects on different topics related to environmental issues.
- National Science Day is observed on 28<sup>th</sup> February.
- Our NSS students also enlighten the villagers on these issues during their camps.
- Every year "Hareli Jagar" (a Tree Plantation drive) is organized in and around the college campus.

The College caters to the students from all strata of the society from Bhilai and near by villages. Some of them are first generation learners. The best part of these students is their curiosity to learn and mingle with fellow students .The College adopts some common practices such as -

- 1. Evaluation of marks obtained in previous classes.
- 2. Class tests.
- 3. Class room discussions, Seminars and Queries and project works. Additional motivational lectures are organized to enhance the skill and awareness of the students.
- 4. Students are selected to participate in activities at inter collegiate, inter University and inter State level cultural festivals and competitions which gives them a chance to mingle with their peer group.
- 5. Advanced learners are given an opportunity to lead different groups of their class so as to encourage leadership skill, communicative skill and competitive spirit.
- 6. Seminars and Workshops help to enhance their knowledge and nurture their skills.
- 7. Special counseling sessions are organized to appraise the students of various job opportunities and avenues available and to aquaint the students with the latest trends of the corporate sector and job market.
- 8. All students are guided and encouraged to participate in various competitive examinations. Winners are given special recognition in terms of prizes and certificates
- 9. A few of our students have successfully cleared MAT, NET, SLET and bank exams.
- 2.2.6. - After the admission, if the students find any difficulty in the chosen subject, they have an opportunity to change their subject by the dates as decided by the university.
- Provision is made for payment of fee in installments.
- Educational subsidiary for poor students in the form of scholarships is provided.
- Book bank facility is provided.

- The students are evaluated regularly by internal assessment via class tests, assignments, group discussions, seminars etc. .
- The examinations are conducted by the University as per the University Examination Time Table.

The College has a well established internet facility in library consisting of more than 10 computers available for teachers and students during College hours.
  - Well equipped laboratories facilitated with modern equipment.
  - Our teachers have adopted various methods to make the teaching process more student centric, participatory, interactive and innovative,through:
  - o Chalk and talk based Lectures.
  - o Power Point based Lectures.
  - o Innovative teaching like use of models and charts.
  - o Smart class room.
  - o Seminars and Project-work.
  - o Interactive learning through group debate, field study, visits, trips, excursion tours etc.

- The College publishes its own magazine "Ritika" to promote the writing and creative skills.

April 2012. The College subscribes to N-list Programme for accessing e-sources.

In addition to the chalk and talk method, to enhance effective teaching our faculty uses other modern teaching methods such as Power point presentation ,Innovative teaching with the use of models and charts, Smart class room,Interactive learning through group debates Seminars and Project-work. Field study, Visits, Trips, Excursion tour.

The students and faculty are exposed to advanced level of knowledge and skills by the following practices:

- Institution provides internet facilities for all the departments so that the students and teachers can update their knowledge using the e-resources.
- Students and teachers participate in National and International Seminars/ Conferences/ Workshops to keep pace with the advanced level of knowledge and skills.
- Institute provides funds and facilities to various departments to organize seminars, exhibitions and guest faculty lectures.
- Educational tours and trips are also organized by the institution to enhance the cooperative skill and knowledge of the students.
- Additional reference room with internet facility of the college library enriches the students and teachers with the activities going on in relevant fields.

Library is the main and widely used teaching learning resource. The College has one Central library and departmental libraries in all P.G. departments. The central library contains 28,600 books, CDs, DVDs, journals, magazines etc. The library has Book Bank facility for SC/ST/OBC and economically deprived students. It also has a reference section, a reading section and an internet section where e-resources can be accessed through N-LIST. About 750 users visit the library per week.

The College ensure the curriculum completion within the planned time frame and calendar.

- The College follows the academic calendar of the university every year which accommodates all the curricular, co-curricular and extracurricular activities.

- As far as the curricular programme is concerned, teachers prepare their teaching programme which contains the day to day lecture programme to facilitate teachers complete their syllabus within the prescribed time. The programmes are strictly monitored by the Principal.
- The academic calendar and work distribution is done at the beginning of every academic session.
- The University and all Government programmes are accommodated within the academic schedule.

### 2.5.6 What are the mechanisms for redressal of grievances with reference to evaluation both at the College and University level?

- The College has adopted annual examination pattern for UG classes and Semester examination pattern for PG classes and follows the directives of Pt. Ravishankar Shukla University, Raipur in this aspect.
- The students who are not satisfied with the marks have a choice of re-evaluation of the answer sheets.
- The students can appear in examination or ATKT if they fail.

#### 2.6. Students' performance and learning -

### 2.6.1 Has the College clearly stated learning outcomes? If yes give details on how the students and staff are made aware of these?

Yes, the College clearly states the learning outcome as it is a part of assessment of the service provided and the activities and efforts made by the College is bearing good results at personal and social level.

- The highest and lowest scores are marked specifically.
- The overall percentage of the students passing every year is calculated.
- The performances of students in co-curricular activities at local, state and national level (such as cultural activities, sports, athletics, NSS) are analysed separately and achievement/ honours, if any are recorded.
- All these assessment methods help the College to analyse and evaluate its own efforts and hence to take necessary reforms if required.
- 2.6.2. Enumerate on how the institution monitors and communicates the progresses and performance of students through the duration of the course/programme? Provide an analysis of the students results/achievement (programmes/courses wise for last four years) and explain the difference if any and patterns of achievement across the programmes/courses offered.
  - The progress of each and every student is monitored continuously throughout the academic year.

- Class tests are conducted every month and the teaching staff of concerned subjects keep a record of performance of the students.
- Weaker students are identified by the performance in the class test and are advised to work harder for improvement.
- A track record of the student's performance is maintained and the students whose performance is constantly decreasing are sent to the Principal and if necessary their parents are also intimated of the same.
- Pre model exam/assignments are undertaken before the commencement of model exam so as to access the preparation of the students for their final exam.
   \*\* The details of the results have been given in 2.5.5 above.

### 2.6.3. How are the teaching learning and assessment strategies of the institution structured to facilitate the achievement of the intended learning outcome?

The teaching learning and assessment strategies of the institution are structured strictly to facilitate the intended learning outcome and complete personality development of the students.

- Efforts are made right from the time of admission so that the students can enhance their potential in the area of their interest. The students along with their parents have to undergo a brief counselling session before their subjects or streams are allotted.
- Teaching methods including the medium are so chosen that the students get the maximum benefits.
- Fast and slow learners are identified in each subject and they are taken care of by various supportive programmes such as remedial coaching, revision and extra classes and assignments.
- Special care is taken to ensure that enough learning resources including text books, reference books, journals, internet facilities are made available to each student.
- Book bank facility ensures that the economically backward students are not deprived from the learning resources.
- The students also get plenty of opportunities to develop and highlight other aspects of their personality apart from their curricular aspects. Activities and competitions are organized by different cells and associations of the College in every academic year in which the students participate enthusiastically.

2.6.4 What are the measures/initiatives taken up by the institution to enhance the social and economic relevance (student's placements, entrepreneurship, innovations and research aptitude development among students etc.) of the courses offered?

The institute seriously works for the socio-economic development of the students.

- The students are made aware of various issues of social relevance by conducting various activities which include debate, village visit, skit and drama etc.
- Many important days and dates as recognized by UNO and National and International organizations such as Literacy Day, Women's Day, Human Rights Day, Peace Day, AIDS Day, Hareli-jagar (Vanmahotsav), Martyrs Day, etc. are observed in the College to convey the message contained in them to the students so that they develop interest and take future innovation in the required direction.
- Students are encouraged to take part in the NSS and various cells and associations of college to boost up their interest to take on the social responsibilities.
- The industrial visits, visits to research centers, field visits also enhance the innovative and research aptitude of the students.
- Career counselors are invited for their lectures, seminars, workshops to help the students to analyse their potentials and hence to drive their energy and effort in the specific fields.
- The placement cell of the College notifies the forth- coming competative examinations of the various bodies to the students and guides them for preparing for the same , and also helps the students to fill online form for the same.

### 2.6.5. How does the institution collect and analyse data on student performance and learning outcomes and use it for planning and overcoming barriers of learning?

Institution follows systematic procedures to collect and analyze data on students learning outcome –

- Results of previous year annual exams are collected by respective teacher subject wise and merit list is prepared.
- Class-tasks such as seminars and presentation also asses performance of the students.
- Regular class tests are taken by the respective subject teacher and marks obtained are recorded.

### 2.6.6. How does the institution monitor and ensure the achievement of learning outcomes?

The institution follows the standard evaluation process and ensures the achievement of the learning outcome.

- We conduct interview and counselling at the time of admission.
- At the beginning of each academic session, previous year's results of each subject are analyzed and corrective measures are taken .
- The concerned subject teacher takes class test on regular basis and also evaluates the performance of students via assignment, seminar, projects, field visit and their performance is recorded.
- Quarterly analysis of attendance of the students in the College is done on regular basis in the staff meeting.
- The slow-learners are identified, their problems are understood and necessary steps are taken to ameliorate them. The slow learners are provided with revision, extra and remedial classes in the required subjects.
- All the subject teachers submit their evaluation report to the Principal and the same is also discussed in the academic circle of IQAC meeting.
- 2.6.7. Does the institution and individual teachers use assessment/evaluation outcome as an indication for evaluating students' performance, achievement of learning objects and planning? If 'yes' provide details in the process and cite few examples.
  - Yes, the College teachers use assessment/evaluation as an indication for evaluating student's performances, achievements of learning objectives and are used for further planning.
  - The students who have extracurricular achievements at State level, University level are given extra weightage of 5% marks at the time of admission in sports and extra curricular activities.
  - The students bringing laurels -to the college in academics, sports and extra curricular activities are honoured by the management.

### CRITERION – III RESEARCH, CONSULTANCY AND EXTENSION

#### 3.1 **Promotion of Research**

### 3.1.1 Does the institution have recognized research center of the affiliating University or any other agency/organization?

Yes, but with MATS University. However, the institution has all the facilities to carry out research for both minor and major research projects sponsored by the UGC and other agencies. Students are also involved in the research process through the curriculum units like project reports and case studies.

# **3.1.2** Does the Institution have a research committee to monitor and address the issues of research? If so, what is its composition? Mention a few recommendations made by the committee for implementation and their impact.

The Research Committee is duly constituted under the chairmanship of the Principal and has IQAC coordinator and research supervisors/senior teaching staff as members. The faculties seek guidance from the Research Committee for writing research papers, articles and preparing research proposals for major and minor research projects. The committee also conducts sessions for research methodology and organizes lectures of renowned researchers-

- The committee also encourages various departments to upgrade and get registered as the recognized research centre.
- The committee provides all the information to the faculty members about the Minor and Major research projects sponsored by various agencies.
- The committee encourage teachers to take up major and minor research projects and help in timely submission of proposals.
- The committee evaluate proposals before forwarding the same for approval.
- The committee also provides assistance to the research scholars with reference to research proposals, Research methodology, statistical packages etc.
- The committee discusses various aspects of research programme on a timely basis.

### **3.1.3** What are the measures taken by the institution to facilitate smooth progress and implementation of research schemes/projects?

The college considers research activity as an important aspect for quality upgradation of both the teaching staff and students and therefore strives to create an atmosphere conducive to research through the following efforts:

- Autonomy to the Principal investigator: The principal investigator of a major/minor research project is allowed to conduct her research in a free atmosphere without any interference from the college management.
- 2) Timely availability or release of resources: In case of sponsored research projects, 50% of the total allocation is usually received by the college from the sponsoring agencies like the UGC or CGCOST for the purchase of books, equipments, stationary, travel, and contingencies. The funds sanctioned to the principal investigator are released without delay according to prevalent norms.
- 3) Adequate infrastructure and human resources: The following facilities are available to teachers for conducting research in the college: The college has availed National Knowledge Network connectivity. w. e. f. April, 2012.
- Central Library with over 28600 text books, reference books, encyclopedia etc, access to e-resources through N-List program is provided.
- Collection of research projects and dissertations of M.Sc., PGDCA, B.Com with Computer Application is available for ready reference.
- Computer Lab with unlimited internet facility;
- 4) Time-off, reduced teaching load, special leave etc. to teachers: There is a provision of rebate of two periods per week for Research Supervisors. The teachers working on the research projects are entitled to study leave of various durations. The college also allows these teachers to visit local libraries and other relevant laboratory, educational institution for collecting data if required after their teaching assignments for the day are over.
- 5) Support in terms of technology and information needs: Research personnels in the institute are offered all the available facilities for conducting research work. They can purchase all the necessary equipments required by them from their sanctioned

grant, in case the same are not available in the college. The college allows the use of computer labs, library resources and internet facilities to teachers while on campus.

- 6) Facilitate timely auditing and submission of utilization certificate to the funding authorities: Our management has its own auditors and therefore there is no delay in audit and utilization certificates.
- The principal investigators are rendered complete but responsible autonomy in their research projects (from the initial project preparation to the final submission of the same).

### **3.1.4** What are the efforts made by the institution in developing scientific temper and research culture and aptitude among students?

The College Management motivates teachers to take up major and minor research projects, publish research papers in reputed journals, and attend conferences, seminars and workshops for enhancing scientific aptitude and promoting research culture. The teaching staff motivates the students by organizing debates, essay writing, quiz and poster making competitions on various Science events. National Science day is celebrated every year to motivate and to develop a scientific temper amongst students.

The faculty stimulates students to develop critical, logical thinking and evoke scientific temper for the creation of a learning environment to develop their intellectual aptitude.

- The institution organizes study tours for final year students of all departments. The students are taken to other educational institutes to interact with their research scholars.
- The College also organizes UGC sponsored Seminars, Conferences and Workshops of State & National level to create curiosity among the students as well as to give a chance to meet the learned faculties of the related fields.

The College encourages and has ensured students participation and provides opportunity to interact with them.. These lectures have helped in creating a vision and motivating the teachers and students to understand and explore new areas of research.

There is no provision of Sabbatical Leave, however teachers can be given duty leave for pursuing research work as per the directives of UGC and State Government. . The College Management allows the use of equipments of the laboratories, modest facilities of the library and internet to promote a research culture in the campus.

The research finding related to academics is shared with the faculty and students through circulars and meetings. We are yet to get an opportunity to transfer the research findings to the community for their benefit and utilization.

#### **3.2** Resource Mobilization for Research.

### **3.2.1** What percentage of the total budget is earmarked for research? Give details of major head of expenditure, financial allocation and actual utilization.

The institution is not a recognized research centre, hence, there is no specific allocation for research in the college budget. The grants received for minor and major

research projects from various sponsoring agencies are disbursed as per the requirement of the concerned teaching faculty.

The College is committed to provide assistance to the teaching faculty as well as postgraduate students to carry out research and project activities. The College management encourages research culture by setting up the required infrastructural facilities such as well-equipped library, laboratories, internet terminals, language laboratory for the purpose of facilitating research activities among the staff and students.

**3.2.2** Is there a provision in the institution to provide seed money to the faculty for research? If so, specify the amount disbursed and the percentage of the faculty that has availed the facility in the last four years?

The role assumed by the institution is that of a modest facilitator only at present.

### 3.2.3 What are the financial provisions made available to support student research projects by students?

The institution does not provide any financial support to the students for the conduct of research. However, the institution provides support to students by making available all infrastructural facilities including ICT support for finalising their project works. Relaxation in the faculty stay in the college is provided daily in order to help the faculty to report at their research centers.

3.2.4 How does the various departments/units/staff of the institute interact in undertaking inter-disciplinary research? Cite examples of successful endeavors and challenges faced in organizing interdisciplinary research.

The departments of Physics, Biotechnology, Chemistry, Botany, Zoology and Home Science have interdisciplinary research programmes and have a collaborative approach.

### 3.2.5 How does the institution ensure optimal use of various equipment and research facilities of the institution by its staff and students?

• The institution offers a number of facilities to its staff and students for research and academic purposes. These include library resources, N- LIST and INFLIBNET,

educational CD's and software, reading room and the computational facilities available in Computer Department. These facilities are utilized by teaching and student community.

The college has availed National Knowledge Network connectivity from April, 2012. The institution ensures the optimal use of various equipments and research facilities by mutual cooperation and organizes inter disciplinary academic activities.

### **3.2.6.** Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facility? If 'yes' give details.

The institution has not received any special grants or finances from industry and any other agency till date.

Research projects are funded by different funding agencies like UGC and CGCOST.

#### **3.3** Infrastructure for Research

### **3.3.1** What are the research facilities available to the students and research scholars within the campus?

The college provides all infrastructural support available in the college.

Library Resources: Books, Journals, Periodicals and reference materials.

**ICT support**: Computer labs, internet and software, printers, scanners, photocopiers, video cameras etc.

**Equipment:** Inter departmental usage of equipment and other facilities is encouraged.

Grants as sanctioned by the UGC for Minor Research Projects are given to the faculty to procure the requisite equipment, chemicals and books etc,. Duty leave can also be granted as per the provisions of the UGC.

## 3.3.2 What are the institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers especially in the new an emerging areas of research?

The institutional strategies for planning, upgrading and creating infrastructural facilities to meet the needs of researchers especially in the new and emerging areas of research are:

- 1. The institution has set-up a Research Cell under the IQAC for planning, upgrading and creating an environment suitable for conducting research activities.
- 2. The institution always motivates the staff to attend conferences, seminars, and research workshops and encourages them to present and publish research papers on these occasions.
- 3. The college motivates the faculty members to pursue major and minor research project sponsored by agencies like the UGC on the areas which are relevant to the students and the region.

### After taking into account the research needs of the teachers and students, the college focuses on the infrastructural requirements as follows:

- (a) Purchase of necessary equipment/books and other reference material through the research grants received by the institution.
- (b) Making available at the institutional end other infrastructural facilities, not covered in research proposals by researchers.
- (c) Since all purchases under capital expenditure are deemed as assets, the college encourages the research proposals so that new assets can be added.
- 3.3.3 Has the institution received any special grants or finances from the industry or other beneficiary agency for developing research facilities?? If 'yes', what are the instruments/ facilities created during the last four years.

No such special grants or finances have been received by the institution.

**3.3.4** What are the research facilities made available to the students and research scholars outside the campus / other research laboratories?

The staff and students usually work only on those research projects which can be smoothly conducted in the college itself using the existing facilities in the college. However, if the research projects demand, the students and staff members can pursue research outside the college with prior permission of the concerned college. Teachers and students can also visit University departments and Library and use the resources available there being the bonafide students of the college affiliated to the University.

### **3.3.5** Provide details on the library/ information resource centre or any other facilities available specifically for the researchers?

The College Library has 28,600 text and reference books in addition to scholarly journals and magazines, encyclopedias etc. Open access is provided to all the readers. The library subscribes to N-LIST programme through which access is provided to e-resources. Internet facilities with download and printing facility is also provided to researchers.

### 4.1 Physical Facilities

The College campus is centrally located in the Bhilai Township of Bhilai Steel Plant, spread in an area of 14 acres of land in khasra number 62/001. This land has been given by B.S.P on lease to Bhilai Education Trust, Bhilai, the founder registered body under M.P Public Trust Act 1951 with registration No.9BN3(2)1977-78 dated 18//9/1978. The building has been constructed in accordance with the master plan passed by Town Architect Planning Bureau, Town administration Department, B.S.P. Bhilai.

### 4.1.1 What is the policy of the Institution for creation and enhancement of infrastructure that facilitate effective teaching and learning?

The management **Bhilai Education Trust**, is very supportive of all the curricular and extra-curricular activities conducted in the college and ensures that the college has necessary infrastructure to facilitate the conduct of these activities. As a result, there is always an upgradation of infrastructure and facilities every time some new course or programme is started. Over the years, thus, we have been adding buildings, classrooms, computer labs, equipment, furniture and fixtures etc. to the existing infrastructure. The institution ensures that the available infrastructure facilities meet the requirements of students with physical disabilities. Taking into consideration the special requests from such students immediate steps are taken for their assistance like:-

- Arrangement of examination rooms on the ground floor.
- As there are no ramps in the college building at present the classes of the students are conducted in the ground floor only.
- Ramp way at the entrance of the main building and at the auditorium.
- The location of the College library, auditorium etc in the ground floor help in the easy accessibility of this group.

### **A. Hostel Facility**

- The College provides hostel facility for girl students. At present, there is a girls' hostel under the College management with a capacity of housing 100 inmates.

- Rooms are 3-seated and furnished.
- The hostel is connected to the generator.

**Facilities for medical emergencies -** The hostel has a first aid box comprising of necessary medicines. In case of emergencies inmates are referred to the main hospital of Bhilai Steel Plant which is adjacent to the hostel.

- The hostel has a **constant supply of safe drinking water.**
- The hostel also comes under the vigil of the College night security personnel

The girls hostel has a reading room, with newspapers and magazines. Students are also allowed to watch television during their leisure hours in the recreation/ mess room.

- 4.3.5 How does the institution facilitate extensive use of ICT resources including development and use of computer-aided teaching/ learning materials by its staff and students?
  - a. ICT orientation has now become an order of the day in the Education field. In view of this, the college has also initiated the use of ICT for execution of curricula by way of PPT presentations, downloads of scholarly talks and educational videos, internet-based assignments for students.
  - b. The institution makes maximum efforts to facilitate the use of computers for teaching learning.

The University curriculum integrates the use of ICT. Both the P.G and U.G Programmes require the submission of assignments and the completion of projects and seminars. The faculty encourages student to make use of technology in the preparation of the same and also browse the internet to collect study materials. Students prepare powerpoint presentations for seminars. The College also arranges faculty training programmes whereby they are helped to develop computer aided teaching.

- 4.3.6 Elaborate giving suitable examples on how the learning activities and technologies deployed (access to on-line teaching learning resources, independent learning, ICT enabled classrooms/learning spaces etc.) by the institution place the student at the centre of Teaching-learning process and render the role of a facilitator for the teacher.
  - (a)The college has to its disposal substantial IT related infrastructure and technology to take care of students' day-to-day curricular needs. There are 02 IT labs and one special

room with an LCD projector for ICT enabled teaching-learning activities. Similarly, laptops/LCD projectors are allocated to teachers for delivering PPT based teaching units of their respective syllabi. We also conduct classroom seminars where students have to make PPT presentations.

We also conduct special sessions for students where they are trained for creating email id's, sending emails, using internet, downloading material from the Net etc. Owing to the above, the students are now gradually shifting into the self-learning mode while teachers are more and more becoming the facilitators.

- (b) The learning activities and technologies deployed by the institution aim at placing the student at the centre of the teaching-learning process. Methods to achieve this include ICT, open access to the Broad Bands, Network Resources and Computer Lab etc. The faculty uses the available infrastructure in the teaching learning processes for PPT's, online presentation of important areas, sessions through LCD projectors, CD's, films, etc. The faculties are also encouraged to utilize the available infrastructure and e-learning tools to upgrade their knowledge.

- 4.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure, facilities and equipment of the college?
  - a. The College Management plans the budgetary provisions for the various needs regarding the maintenance and upkeep of the infrastructure at the beginning of each academic year. They ensure the optimal utilization of the provisions in the budget for various activities.
  - b. The College timely applies and receives special grants from the UGC for construction of buildings and purchase and maintenance of equipment. In case of construction and purchase of equipment of self-financing courses, the expenditure on maintenance and upkeep is borne by our management. Even in case of Grant-in-aid courses, all inadmissible expenditure incurred for maintenance and upkeep is borne by the management.
  - c. The College takes necessary care and precautions towards the maintenance of its infrastructure facilities and laboratories. Pre-monsoon maintenance is undertaken. Furniture including benches, desks, tables, cupboards and chairs are repaired and some are replaced. Technicians are called for repairs of LCD, computers, laboratory equipments and apparatus.

The caliberation and other precision measures for equipment/instruments are taken up as per the advice by manufacturers. Maintenance of equipments/instruments is being done by the respective maintenance agencies. Caliberation of equipments by technical experts is carried out as and when necessary.

4.4.4 What are the major steps taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipment (voltage fluctuations, constant supply of water etc.)?

The major steps the institution has taken for location, upkeep and maintenance of sensitive equipments include the provision of UPS, inverter, diesel generator and a

24x7 battery backup for voltage maintenance. All the computer labs are supplied with UPS for regular backup and provisions for the same have also been made at major locations like the academic/administrative office, college library.

Electrical department of Bhilai Steel Plant has provided the college with a dedicated electric line. As such, there are no voltage fluctuations. College has a diesel operated 125 KVA electricity generator. Uninterrupted power supply using inverters is installed in all the existing computer laboratories. The Public Works Department of Bhilai Steel Plant has provided a steady water pipe line to the college. The college has huge water storage tanks which provide constant supply of water.

The students who are visually impaired are given examination papers half an hour in advance. The class having a student with a physical disability is allotted a class room on the ground floor.

#### (3) Overseas Students:

Not applicable to our institution.

#### (4) Students to Participate in Competitions:

The students are encouraged to participate in competitions and events at various levels. Training and practice sessions are co-ordinated by the Cultural Co-ordinator with the help of the faculty. Facilities such as Traveling Allowance (TA) and other expenses are provided and attence are given to them. Our faculty always accompanies the students for the competitions and events outside the campus and they are treated on duty.

#### (5) Medical Assistance to Students:

The institution organizes activities and programmes to promote good health among students and also to create awareness about health related issues. In case of emergency the students are taken to the adjacent Main Hospital of Bhilai Steel Plant escorted suitably by teaching staff.

#### (6) Organizing Coaching Classes for Competitive Exams:

The information of all forthcoming competitive exams is put upon the notice board. The institution allows interested coaching institutes of Bhilai to address the students.

#### (7) Skill Development:

The institution conducts talks and trainings in Soft Skills'and CV Writing. Students are exposed to the latest media software and use of e-learning resources like online training manuals. Students are trained to present papers using the LCD. Facilities like LCD in classrooms, Internet through Wi-Fi, Learning Management System are made available for students. The college has used Spoken Tutorial programmes of I.I.T. Mumbai, to improve the information technology skills of the students.

#### (8) Support for 'Slow Learners':

Remedial classes'in all subjects are conducted for slow learners and weaker students. Besides remedial classes, tutorials are also conducted for these students. Counseling through the Mentorship System also helps to monitor the progress of slow learners'.

### (9) Exposure of Students to other Institutions of Higher Learning/ Corporate/ Business House:

Students participate and present papers in seminars and workshops conducted by other institutions. Students are taken on field trips to industries, corporate business houses and institutions to give them firsthand experience. Spoken Tutorial programmes conducted by I.I.T., Mumbai supplement the teaching material for various IT related courses. Students are encouraged to register for various courses.

#### (10) Publication of Student Magazines:

The students contribute articles for the college magazine titled 'Ritika'.

- (a) There exists a Career guidance and Skill development Cell which helps the students by organising interdisciplinary interactive programmes with entrepreneurs, educationists and personnels from coaching institutes regularly on Career guidance.
- (b) The College regularly arranges industrial visits to inculcate in students the entrepreneurial skills. The College also takes initiative in inviting the experts from industries and business houses to guide the students. The College also organizes various workshops from time to time to for the students to aquire the desired and required skills. Due to the above efforts, many students have gained practical

exposure to the real world scenario leading to the setting up of their own establishments.

The cultural activities as a part of the academic calendar are organized. Various competitions such as quiz competetions, debates, sports, cultural activities provide a platform to the students. Best Performances are acknowledged and rewarded.

- Additional academic support : Relaxation in admission.

- Sports uniform and materials : Players are given sports kits and uniform.
- Any other : Motivation to the students by awarding their excellence.

#### (1) Additional academic support and flexibility in examination:

Extra classes are arrenged for those students participating in extracurricular events to make up for their absence in regular classes. The College examination is scheduled in such a manner so as to accommodate these students and enable them to appear for their exams.

### (2) Special dietary requirements, sports uniform and materials:

Students participating in sports activities are given a practice allowance to be used for their diet requirements. They are provided with sportswear and a sports kit. In case of any injury during the game they are provided First Aid and then with the proper medical treatment

#### (3) Any Other:

The institution reimburses expenditure incurred by the students to participate in extracurricular and co-curricular activities. The Cultural Coordinator and other faculty members monitor and guide the students participating in such activities. Inter-college, Intra-college events and programmes are organized by the institution. Studentoriented events such as Social Service, NSS Camps, Study tours are annually conducted by the college. The College has instituted awards to recognize the achievements of outstanding students in sports and other co-curricular activities. The College declares champion of the year on the basis of their performance and achievements in the sports activities.

The library subscribes to a wide range of books and journals which serve as a ready reference meant especially for competitive examinations
  - (c) The College has a full-fledged Career Guidance Cell which helps students in preparing for various competitive examinations. The College provides updated study material to students through the college library. The library has the study material for examinations like NET, SLET, CAT, GMAT, UPSC, Railway, Bank etc.

The institution has always strived to provide academic, social and psychological support to our students. The counseling services provided by the institution include:-

Department level guidance provided by class teachers for helping students to realise their strengths and weaknesses. Through such one –to- one interaction the faculties identify the problems of the students. They are then directed for expert counseling, if needed. The institution has a Counseling Cell which monitors and directs counseling activities on campus. The Cell conducts talks, workshops and interactive sessions for the students during the academic year. A Professional Counselor is available on the campus. The Mentoring System monitors the overall performance of the students and provides academic, career and personal guidance. At the beginning of the academic year, the first year students attend an Orientation programme which initiates the introduction of a fresher to the academic and co-curricular activities of the college.

The various committees counsel students for their academic, personal, career and psycho- social needs.

The College is run by Bhilai Education Trust. The Governing Body directs the Principal to act according to the decisions taken by the Body and the Principal takes the message to the faculty. The Principal leads a team of faculty members, along with other stakeholders in formulating policies and plans. The College Staff Council, comprises of the Principal and the entire teaching staff of the college. The decisions taken in the Governing Body are conveyed to the College Staff Council by the Principal. The College Staff Council plays a vital role in the functioning of the College. The HODs are responsible for the day to day functioning of their respective departments. The policies, plans and department matters are discussed during the departmental meetings. The Principal has regular meetings with the faculty members who exert their efforts for achieving the goals of the institution.

The Management, the Principal and the faculty work in coordination to formulate and implement its quality policy and plans for assurance and sustenance of quality in higher education. The IQAC, the different committees, cells and clubs are formed with the teaching, non-teaching staff and the students of the college as members. These committees are delegated duties and responsibilities aimed at better governance. They discuss various matters within their purview (like the programmes to be conducted, infrastructural facilities, conduct of examinations etc).

The administrative staff is also entrusted with responsibilities. The infrastructural requirements and their installations in the departments are monitored by the Principal.

The Principal looks after the day-to-day functioning of the college affairs in collaboration with the teaching and non-teaching staff. The faculty puts in their best for the growth of the college.

Suggestions given during meeting with stakeholders are given due consideration in designing of the college plans. Parents, alumni and others always support the activities of the college.

The faculty undertakes research projects and some pursue doctoral research. The college conducts an annual Faculty Enrichment Programme. Members of the Faculty attend seminars/workshops held at the State and National level where they present research papers. They share the inputs gained from these seminars with other faculty members. Individual departments also organize seminars/workshops in the college.

#### Faculty

The faculty members are initiated to develop successful academicians and researchers.

• Workshops and training programmes are conducted for their career and personal growth. The Senior most staff is designated as the Head of the department who

monitors and guides the students and staff of her respective departments in all matters pertaining to quality and quantity.

- The Principal nominates the faculty as incharge of various activities both curricular and extra -curricular on the basis of their skill and interest in the respective activities .
- The faculty members are appointed as incharge of the various cells / associations and clubs to ensure that the various events and activities organized by these clubs are conducted timely, smoothly and successfully.
- Faculty members are also entrusted with Government assignments and duties like census work and election and also to work with NGO's. They also organize seminars and other events independently.

#### **Students Leadership**

Students interested can contest to be elected for different posts of Students Union. These students are either elected or nominated on the basis of the academic performance in the qualifying examination for various posts as per the directives of the affiliating University.

The office bearers are appraised with the problems and issues faced by the students, the solutions to which are found by discussions and deliberations.

- Every class has a Class Representatives.
- PG departments have their own associations and the President, Vice President, Secretary
- Treasurer are nominated from amongst the students.
- Various cells and clubs have also been constituted to ensure the smooth organization of academic cultural, literary and sports activities.

#### Administrative / Supporting staff

Office Administration is headed by the senior most clerk. They manage the admission, fee collection of the different streams, examination related works,documentation of results and managing the financial accounts. Their work proficiency is enhanced through regular monitoring and guidance of the college management.

# 6.1.7 How does the college delegate authority and provide operational autonomy to the departments / units of the institution and work towards decentralized governance system?

- The College ensures decentralized governance by delegating authority and providing autonomy to all the units of the institution.
- The College Council headed by the Principal with the support of HODs and various committees play a pivotal role in decision-making.
- Administrative powers and responsibilities are delegated to teachers on the basis of their competence, commitment and aptitude to meet the institutional objectives.
- The IQAC coordinator collects feedback from students and monitors academic activities.
- The HODs are responsible for task allocation and monitoring.
- The departments meet formally and informally to discuss work distribution, evaluate the performance, take remedial measures and prepare action plans for future development.

Assignment of workload, planning and purchase of departmental assets are made at the departmental level. Each department plans and organizes the academic activities related to its subject. They are given freedom to invite guest speakers, accompany students for field trips and other events outside the college.

The Emphasis of the College Mission has always been commitment to our students and empower them as enlighted citizens, we plan to follow such practices so that we can extract the best out of them.



#### 6.4 Financial Management and Resource Mobilization

# 6.4.1 What is the institutional mechanism to monitor effective and efficient use of available financial resources?

The following financial resources are available to the institute:

#### (A) Grant-in-aid structure

- 1. Salary of Teaching Staff and Non-Teaching Staff of Government Grant-in-Aid Courses is received from the State Government.
- 2. UGC assistance through development grants, merged schemes and special schemes.

#### (B) Self-financing structure

- 1. Fees from the students.

In order to ensure the effective and efficient use of available funds, Bhilai Mahila Mahavidyalaya is following these systems.

- Principal is responsible for all financial matters in the institute along with the Principal of the nodal college and Management Representative of Bhilai Education Trust for Salary Maintenance Grant received from the State Government.
- 2. Principal and Management Representative of Bhilai Education Trust for salary of the staff of self financing courses.
- 3. The financial powers are as follows
- a) Principal-Contingency/operating expenses within approved budgets, the maximum limit being Rs 25000/- for each case and annual limit of Rs 5 Lacs for Government Aided, Self financing and UGC Grant
- b) Chairman-Rs 2.5 Lacs for each case and annual limit of Rs 25 Lacs.
- c) Finance committee –This committee consists of Patron,B.E.T, Managing Trustee,Trustee member and Secretary,B.E.T.
- 4. All disbursements are made by cross cheque.
- 6. All expenditure at the institute level for purchases/maintenance is to be done from the non-salary grants and should not exceed the limits of the budget.
- 7. The institute has to submit annual budgets to Bhilai Education Trust for its proposed expenditure.
- 8. The institution monitors the effective and efficient use of the available financial resources of the college.
- A draft budget is prepared every year taking into consideration the financial requirement of each department and the general development plans.
- Major purchases are made with the approval and sanction of the management.
- Quotation system is followed for the purchase of items.
- All the formalities are duly completed and proper records are maintained for every purchase.
- The Principal and the Management review financial resources regularly to ensure their optimum usage.
- The Principal is responsible for monitoring and controlling the financial procedures.
- The Head Accountant maintains accounts of all the funds.
- Each and every transaction is supported by vouchers.
- Payments are made only if approved and duly signed by the Principal and Secretary, B.E.T.

- The institution conducts an internal and external audit to monitor the effective and efficient use of available financial resources.
- 6.4.2 What are the institutional mechanisms for internal and external audit? When was the last audit done and what are the major audit objections? Provide the details on compliance.

The institution has both the internal and external audit mechanisms for both grant-inaid and self-financing structures.

#### Grant-in-aid structure

For Grant-in-aid structure, Internal Audit is done by a team of auditors appointed by Bhilai Education Trust every year.

External Audit is also done by Local Fund Auditors, Durg for both salary and nonsalary grants. At stage two, the Senior Auditor/AG audits the accounts and records their objections, if any, for compliance by the institute. The last audit was done for the session 2012-13 and the internal auditor has not submitted the audit report.

The accounts of independent units like NSS, PTA, Add on Courses, workshops, seminars, conferences etc are audited separately.

#### **Self-financing Structure:**

- For Self-financing structure, Internal and External Audit is done by Bhilai Education Trust every year.
- The College incorporates healthy audit practices in a number of ways.
- The Management has appointed an approved Chartered Accountant to audit the
- yearly accounts of the college.

The institute has to rely heavily on the UGC grant which gives financial assistance to colleges under 2f and 12 B UGC Act of 1956 for building classrooms, hostels, renovation, purchases of books, equipment and furniture for capital expenditure. Assets are also created through the grants released for minor and major research projects.

The major sources of institutional receipts/funding of the college are as follows:

- Total fee collected from the students.
- Various grants and financial aids received from the UGC.
- Grants for conducting Conference received from the UGC.
- Lease rentals of the college canteen.
- Contributions made by the alumni.
- PTA and college development funds. The income and expenditure statement of the academic and administrative activities of last four years have been attached in the annexure.

### 6.4.4 Give details on the efforts made by the institution in securing additional funding and the utilization of the same (if any).

As a responsible institute, the college is always conscious of the needs of students and for fulfillment of the same tries to generate as many resources as possible through the prescribed sources besides the State Government grants which are as follows:

- 1. UGC
- UGC remains the chief funding agency besides the State Government for all affiliated colleges under 2(f) and 12(B)Act.1956 . In each plan UGC allocates development grants to all colleges for the construction of classrooms, purchase of equipments,

books etc. In addition, there are special grants under merged schemes. UGC also releases funds for Minor and Major Research Projects for which we apply for from time to time.

The College employs various methods to mobilize the resources it requires for the welfare of the students.

- The expenditure for the conduct of seminars and conferences is met by the grants received from the UGC.
- The College applied and has been sanctioned grants under the various schemes of the UGC.
- An amount of Rupees Sixty three lakhs was received for the construction of an indoor stadium.
- An amount of Rupees Sixty three lakhs seventy five thousand for the construction of new ladies hostel. The fees collected from the students is also very helpful.

  - (e) Communication of Staff with IQAC : The Principal, who is also a member of the IQAC, communicates the decisions to the faculty in the staff meetings. Various committees are formed to plan and organize the different events/functions in the college.

#### 6.5.2 Framework for Quality Assurance:

The College has set up various committees (admission, timetable, examination, attendance, sports, discipline etc.) comprising of members of the faculty and of the non-teaching staff to co-ordinate and ensure that the administrative and academic activities are completed within the stipulated time.

#### 6.5.3 Training of the Staff for Effective Implementation of the Quality Assurance Procedures:

• Eminent personalities are invited to the institution to provide inputs to the faculty and non-teaching staff on various topics. The institution encourages the training of its staff members for the effective implementation of its Quality assurance procedures. It ensures that the decisions based on the findings of the IQAC are fully adhered to.

- To increase the efficiency in the academic as well as the administrative fields, the college organizes training sessions for its teaching as well as the non teaching staff from time to time.
- Various seminars and workshops have helped the staff to work in a better and more promising way.

# 6.5.4 Does the institution undertake Academic Audit or other external review of the academic provisions? If 'yes', how are the outcomes used to improve the institutional activities?

The institution undertakes its own academic audit through :

- Comparison of the academic performance of the departments.
- A result analysis is done after university examinations, which is communicated to the staff during the staff meetings.
- The preparation of a teaching plan aiming at effective syllabus completion at the beginning of each semester/ session.
- Departmental meetings where classes and subjects are allotted to each teacher and the completion of syllabus is also reviewed. The HOD verifies and ensures that the plans are implemented properly.
- The proper conduct and valuation of assignments, seminars, internal assessment etc., are also verified in the departmental meetings. internal arrangements are made for special classes.

The outcome of such an audit helps to improve the institutional activities in a number of ways.

- Faculty members attend and present papers in International/ National/ State /Regional seminars
- Academic publications/editing of books are undertaken.
- Subscription of on-line journals (N-LIST)
- Conducting of Add-On Courses
- Innovative teaching methods are attempted.

6.5.5 How are the internal quality assurance mechanisms aligned with the requirements of the relevant external quality assurance agencies/regulatory authorities?

The internal quality assurance mechanisms of the institution are designed and implemented on the guidelines of the external quality assurance agencies like the NAAC, the Directorate of Collegiate Education and the affiliating university. The IQAC submits the report to the college on an annual basis which helps the institution to assess its strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and challenges every year, and to rectify the shortcomings at the appropriate time.

# 6.5.6 What institutional mechanisms are in place to continuously review the teaching learning process? Give details of its structure, methodologies of operations and outcome?

The teaching-learning process is continuously reviewed by the Principal, the HODs, the faculty, the students and the PTA on the basis of examination results, feedback and evaluative reports. Based on the feedback collected, improvements are made in the teaching-learning process.

- Constructive methods like Refresher courses/Orientation courses, ICT oriented courses, Communication Skill Development sessions etc motivate both the faculty and students.
- Remedial coaching and study circles are arranged for slow learners.
- Teachers Evaluation by Students: Students evaluate their teachers online at the end of each academic year. Thereafter the feedback is communicated to the teachers for further improvement.
- Teaching Plans: Teaching plans are designed by each teacher, reviewed by HODs and approved by the Principal.
- Syllabus Completion Report: Syllabus completion report is scrutinized by HODs.
- Self-Appraisal Report: Annual performance-based self appraisal report is submitted to the Principal who analyses the data for the purpose of Career Advancement.
- Observation of Lectures: The Principal makes surprise visits to various classes.

## 6.5.7 How does the institution communicate its quality assurance policies, mechanisms and outcomes to the various internal and external stakeholders?

The institution has evolved a strategy of interacting with the stakeholders on different platforms like the Parent Teacher Association, the Alumni meet and other committees which have a fair student representation. The Principal communicates policies regarding quality assurance through the HODs, meetings of the stakeholders, the website, the college admission brochure and the report of the print media to the communication network.

#### 7.1 Environment Consciousness -

#### 7.1.1 Does the Institute conduct a Green Audit of its campus and facilities?

Bhilai Mahila Mahavidyalaya has always shown concern towards environmental issues. Seminars, talks and awareness drives have been conducted to create environmental consciousness among students and society. The college promotes use of non-conventional sources of energy. Other measures taken are plantation drives, anti-plastic drives.

The department of Botany documents trees and plants on the campus. There are 78 species and 66 shrubs which are of flowering, fruit-bearing and medicinal nature.

Even though, we do not conduct a formal Green Audit, the institution has worked out its own mechanism of green audit by entrusting the NSS volunteers with the responsibility of keeping the campus clean. The institution takes care to adopt ecofriendly practices in all its activities. Most of our activities are organized to make students aware of the importance of protecting the environment.

- The Botany Department and two NSS units of the institution are in charge of formulating and supervising activities that promote an environment friendly campus.
- The Eco Club organises environment awareness programmes that promote an ecofriendly campus. In association with the Durg District Forest Department, saplings are planted at different locations in the campus.
- The use of poly bags in the campus is discouraged.
- With the help of the faculty and the NSS unit of the College, the students maintain in house medicinal plants.
- A record of the major herbs and trees in the campus is maintained.
- The institution discourages vehicles from entering the main courtyard of the campus, thereby helping to reduce sound and air pollution.
- In order to express solidarity with the issue of global warming and to help propagate the need to raise the water table, the institution has taken a decision not to pave the campus courtyard.
- Periodical monitoring of the potability of water is also ensured.

We have also undertaken plantation drives in the city and surrounding areas including adjoining villages through NSS and other camps. We also conduct cleanliness programmes and strive to make our campus and city beautiful. We also constantly work on making our campus plastic and litter free.

#### 7.1.2. What are the initiatives taken by the college to make the campus ecofriendly?

#### **Energy conservation**.

• We have always strived to make our students aware of the need to save energy by inculcating in them environmental ethics. Various measures for energy conservation have been taken up by the institution.

#### Use of lights and fans

- The eco-friendly structure of our building facilitates the minimal use of lights and fans. The class rooms are quite spacious and their large windows let in sufficient light and facilitate air circulation.
- Faculty and students are given instructions to switch off lights and fans when not in use.

#### Air conditioner

- The institution encourages the minimal usage of air conditioner units in the campus. During night, the lights are used only at strategic points. Obsolete and energy consuming equipments are periodically discarded and written off.
- The purchase of new air-conditioners, if need arises, are based on energy star rating.

#### **Computers and Lab/Office Equipments**

• Most of the electronic equipments of the institution have the power-saving feature: sleep mode. These are switched off when not in use in order to conserve energy.

#### **Efforts for Carbon neutrality**

- Trees have been planted to check soil erosion and global warming.
- The herbs and medicinal plants as the components of the Botanical garden are the sources for the carbon neutrality.

We do not allow vehicles with high emission to enter the premises. We use the generator sparingly and only when it is absolutely essential to restrict carbon emission. There are enough trees to neutralize any carbon effects.

#### Plantation

- Systemic arrangement and constant maintenance of the potted plants beautify the campus.
- Ashoka trees are planted across the path from the gate to the building entrance.
- Special beds are made for the seasonal and ornamental plants near the porch.
- Special and careful tending of the plants is done by the efficient gardeneres especially appointed for the purpose.

A green and comforting environment surrounded by trees is a characteristic feature of the campus. There are evergreen and flowering plants like angiosperms and gymnosperms in the campus. Majority of the plants have been named and systematically characterized. The NSS units of the college in association with the Durg District Forest Department encourage the students to indulge in plantation programmes both inside and outside the college campus. The ultimate aim of such plantation programmes is to develop in our students and society an interest, awareness and responsibility towards environment and its protection.

- Proper care of the gardens and plantations across the campus is taken.
- Celebration of "Hareli Jagar" (Tree Plantation) on campus every year.
- Plantation of ornamental and fruit bearing plants.
- Growing of medicinal plants.

#### Hazardous waste management.

The activities and functions of the college do not generate any specific hazardous waste, and hence there has not been any need for hazardous waste management till date.

#### e-waste management.

The old and obsolete electronic products like computers, old electrical and electronic items are written off.

#### 7.2 Innovations

There are various bodies functioning in the college which take care of the spiritual, moral and intellectual development of students. The College Council, comprising of the Principal, HODs and other elected staff representatives, is an active body and all important decisions, both academic and non-academic, are taken after discussions in the Council. These decisions are then put into practice with the co-operation of the staff and students.

## 7.2.1 Give details of innovations introduced during the last four years which have created positive impact on the functioning of the college.

At the beginning of every academic year, the departments prepare a plan of their academic activities. Departmental meetings are conducted to ensure that the activities are as per the plan. Teaching sessions are also planned so as to ensure that the syllabus is completed in time and the students are given ample time to prepare for the examinations. Teaching and other extracurricular activities are carried out according to the Calendar released by the University.

 The college has availed National Knowledge Network connectivity from April, 2012. The College applied for 10 Mbps Broadband Over Virtual Private Network (BBoVPN) under "National Mission on Education through Information and Communication Technology" (NME-ICT) scheme of MHRD, Govt. of India and was granted the same w. e. f. April, 2012.

- INFLIBNET services facilitate research activities.
- Various minor researches have also been taken up by the faculty.
- A suggestion box, where students can post their grievances/concerns, is kept outside the office. The College responds positively to suggestions thus received. The Departmental Grievance Redressal Cell has been constituted for addressing the problems faced by the students. The College Grievance Redressal Cell comprising of the Principal, faculty members and student representatives also look into the grievances of the students.

#### Steps to help weaker students

Peer teaching through study circles and remedial teaching, is implemented in the college to help the weaker students.

#### **Career Guidance and Placement Cell**

The College has a Career Guidance and Placement Cell. Both the cells take interest in training students and making them aware of the present scenario of job opportunities. The Career Guidance Cell conducts programmes on personality development, communication skills, small scale entrepreneurship trainings etc. Every year, the Placement Cell makes efforts to provide the graduate and post graduate students opportunities for placements in reputed companies and industries of India.

#### Job-oriented training programmes

The main objective behind these programmes is to inculcate in students skills and knowledge which they are not able to attain through the prescribed University curriculum. These modules enable them to face the tough competitions of industries and other organizations.

#### **Student Progression Services**

Students are encouraged to work out innovative plans, maintain academic culture, organise social events and activities in a number of ways such as seminars, bulletin board displays and cultural programmes. Students are motivated to improve their performance in examinations, co-curricular and extracurricular activities, through

rewards such as trophies, prizes, certificates and scholarships. The Counseling Cell, NSS and the various departments help in maintaining and improving quality.

#### **Innovative ICT based training**

Faculty development programmes have been organized to orient and train faculty in the latest ICT based teaching learning methods. Competency development programmes for faculty like training in computers/smart class and workshops on excellence in Higher Education and Semester System have been organized. Softskills development programmes to boost a positive attitude towards the profession have also been organized for faculty members.

#### Life Guidance Programmes

Every year, the Counselling Cell of the College organizes a Life Guidance Programme for the outgoing students.





#### **Recognition Order**

WHEREAS in terms of Section 14(1) of the NCTE Act, 1993 WRC, NCTE had granted recognition to BHILAI MAHILA MAHAVIDYALAYA, HOSPITAL SECTOR BHILAI - 490009 CHATTISGARH (Code No.-APW04300/723108) vide order No.F.WRC/NCTE/2006-2007/723108/C-25677-25679 DT.07.01.2008.

2. AND WHEREAS in its 117<sup>TH</sup> meeting held on April 20-21, 2009 the Western Regional Committee after considering the report of the visiting team as well as other relevant materials furnished by the applicant institution decided to refuse recognition u/s 14 of NCTE Act of the institution for B.Ed. course and accordingly the refusal order No. WRC/APW04300/723108//117<sup>th</sup>/2009/54757-54763 dated 29.04.2009 was issued to the institution.

3. AND WHEREAS the correspondent, BHILAI MAHILA MAHAVIDYALAYA, HOSPITAL SECTOR BHILAI-490009 CHATTISGARH, has preferred an appeal to NCTE New Delhi under section 18 of the NCTE Act, 1993 against the said Order of WRC.

4. AND WHEREAS having considered the oral submission by the representative of the institution, the written representation, the record of the case and V.T. Report, the Appellate Authority decided to reverse the order of NCTE, WRC. Accordingly, the appeal was accepted with direction to WRC to grant recognition to the institution immediately.

5. NOW, THEREFORE, in exercise of the powers vested under Section 14(3) (a) of the NCTE Act, 1993 and as per the NCTE, New Delhi Order No. F.No.89-940/2009-Appeal dated 08/10/2009 the Western Regiona Committee hereby restore recognition granted to BHILAI MAHILA MAHAVIDYALAYA, HOSPITAL SECTOR BHILAI - 490009 CHATTISGARH vide its order No. F.WRC/NCTE/2006-2007/C-25677 dt 01.1.2008 for one unit of 100 students as per Regulation 7 (11) of the National Council for Teacher Education (Recognition Norms and procedure) Regulations, 2005.

6. The admission of student shall be made only after affiliation by the examining body before th commencement of the academic session and the admission of students shall be competed well before the cut c the date prescribed by the examining body of the academic session 2009-2010, failing which the recognition wi be effective from the academic session 2009-2010.

7. The recognition/permission will operate for 2009-2010 only if the requirement of 180 teaching days in th session be fulfill as per calendar of the University/Affiliation Body.

8. The institution shall, within one month of the receipt of recognition order, convert the endowment fund ar reserve fund account into a joint account to be operated along with an officer of the Western Regional Committee

9. The institution shall comply with the various other norms and standards prescribed in the NCTE regulation as amended from time to time.

10. The institution shall make admission only after it obtains affiliation from the examining body in terms clause 8(12) of the NCTE (Recognition Norms & Procedure) Regulations, 2007.

15. If the institution contravenes any of the above conditions or the provisions of the NCTE Act, Rules, Regulations and Orders made or issued there under, the Regional Committee shall withdraw the recognition as under the provisions of Section 17(1) of the NCTE Act.

16. Further, if the institution is not satisfied by the order, they can prefer an appeal to National Council fo Teacher Education, Hans Bhawan, Wing-II, 1, Bahadur Shah Zafar Marg, Near ITO, New Delhi- 110002 agains this order under section 18 of the NCTE Act, 1993 within 60 days of the issue of this order. The guidelines o appeal are enclosed herewith.



As per the decision taken in the Commission meeting held on 19<sup>th</sup> July 2012, 25% of allocation of XI Plan College Development Assistance was released as "on account grant" for XII Plan period. - 3. The Sanctioned grant may be treated as "Adhoc on account" grant for XII Plan. The allocation made now is Provisional Allocation and the final allocation would be made on finalization of XII Plan Guidelines. The grants sanctioned now would be adjusted against the XII Plan allocation to be made subsequently on the basis of assessment.
- 4. XII<sup>th</sup> Plan may be treated as equivalent to GDA+ merged schemes of XI<sup>th</sup> Plan period, Ratio of allocation under budget heads 35 & 31 (Non-recurring & Recurring) may remain 80:20 as in UGC's guidelines. There should not be any re-appropriation from budget head 35 to 31 or vice versa. The release for SC/ST may be made as per the allocation of 15% and 7.5% respectively.
- The amount of the grant shall be drawn by the Account Officer CRO, UGC, Bhopal (Drawing and Disbursing Officer), University Grants Commission on the Grants-in-aid bill and shall be disbursed to and credited to the Principal, Bhilai Mahila Mahavidyalaya, Hospital Sector, Bhilai Nagar, Bhilai-490009(C.G.) by him/her through RTGS/NEFT.
- 6. The Grant is subject to the Adjustment on the basis of Utilization Certificate in the prescribed Performa submitted by the College.
- The University/College shall maintain proper accounts of the expenditure out the Grants, which shall be 7. utilized, only on approved items of expenditure and ensure proper labeling of the items purchased.
- 8. The Utilization Certificate to the effect that the Grant has been utilized for the purpose for which it has been sanctioned shall be furnished to the University grants Commission as early as possible after the close of the current financial year. Balance grant will be released only on receipt of audited UC and Statement of Expenditure etc., signed by Charted Accountant.
- 9. The assets acquired wholly or substantially out of University Grants Commission's Grant shall not be disposed or encumbered or Utilized for the purpose other than those for which the Grant was give, without proper sanction of the University Grants Commission and should at any time the college ceased to function, such assets shall revert to the University Grants Commission.
- 10. The University/College/Institute shall maintain a Register of Assets acquired wholly or substantially out of the Grants in the prescribed form.
- 11. The grantee Institution shall ensure the Utilization of Grants-in-aid for which it is being sanction/paid. In case of non-utilization/part utilization, or mis-utilization of grants sanctioned by the Commission for the purpose for which these were approved and in accordance with the terms and conditions of the approval or does not furnish the required documents or is disaffiliated from the University the entire amount paid by the Cont 2

Commission shall be refunded by the College with simple interest @ 10% per annum as amended from time to time on unutilized amount from the date of drawl to the date of refund as per provisions contained in General Financial Rules of Government of India will be charged.

12. The grant should not be used for Self-Financing/Unaided Courses.

- 13. It may be noted that the accounts of the grant-in-aid institution shall be subject to inspection by officers of the CRO, UGC, Bhopal
